



## Stories of Displacement: Iman

When Iman was born, she was in good health. Seven months later, she had high fever and medical tests showed that she had a brain medical condition and needed urgent surgery abroad. Her family was not able to afford the surgery; she had to take medication to stay alive.

In June 2014, ISIL took over Mosul. Soon afterwards, when the Iraqi forces started to surround ISIL, medical supplies fell short, causing a hike in prices. Iman's father, who worked in the security services before ISIL, had to stay in hiding.

Iman's mother explained: "Iman lived on two types of medication, but because of the shortages of medicine the specialist doctor stopped prescribing one. She was now taking only Tegretol, and soon ISIL banned that one too. I went through many ups and downs to get the medication. It was very expensive. We sold everything; her uncle even sold his car to help finance her medication and food. She is not able to take food; the only way she can eat normally is through bottle feeding, although she is almost 18 years old."

"After persistent harassment and repeated arrests, my husband fled. When ISIL found out that he had gone, they tried to arrest my son, who was only 15, instead. He ran away and ISIL gunmen chased him down. He went in the direction of the Iraqi forces, who covered him until he reached them.

"We had to stay with relatives until we finally fled Mosul at night. I am very thankful that we got out of there alive. We are living in the Qayara Airstrip site now, and thankfully Iman is receiving the required medicine. She is much better now."
